Quiz

Visit to Brunoy

It didn't bode well at the beginning. I think I can safely say that our group had been looking forward to the first post-Covid get together with old and new friends in Brunoy. But standing outside the Reigate Town Hall at 5 am it was pitch black, cold and wet. The bus was a bit late, and when it came it was smaller than had been anticipated. Not the most auspicious of beginnings, but my goodness! how that changed. The journey itself was destined to be quite long, with a planned break for lunch and a viewing of the cathedral in Amiens, but Brexit reared its ugly head; we got stuck at Dover and missed our ferry. Not only that, the Channel was looking decidedly choppy and it was still raining. Once on the French side, however, we made steady progress, although unfortunately we had to miss Amiens. On arrival in Brunoy we met up with our hosts - for some that was a joyous meeting with old friends, and for newcomers like myself an introduction to new friends. We went direct to the Salon Leclerc for the official welcome - no time to make ourselves look pretty (although Mayor Kelly did stand out in his short-sleeved shirt and pullover!). There were of courses speeches and toasts and the mayors of both Brunoy and Reigate signed a new agreement confirming the continuation of the twinning programme between our two towns. But this was catch-up time! After a long break the twinners from both towns had a lot to tell each other and the newcomers had a lot to learn. Speaking for myself, I found meeting everybody exhilarating but tiring, and I rather suppose most of the Reigate contingent were glad to get to bed that night.

Up early on Saturday – and it wasn't raining!! The Brunoyens had arranged for us to go on a cruise on the Seine continuing on through the nine locks on the Canal St. Martin to La Villette in north east Paris, and it was spectacular. Starting from the Musee d'Orsay, we cruised past the Louvre and Notre Dame (hoping it will be in good shape by the time of the Paris Olympics) before turning on to the Canal. Going through the locks and under the cast-iron footbridges was really special, and fun, especially when the water came rushing through the gates, often soaking the unsuspecting passengers. For part of the trip we passed through three underground vaults, which formed a two kilometre long tunnel, partly under the Bastille, with natural light from above. Impressive! Unfortunately the commentary was not easily understood in either French or English, but the experience was definitely worth it visually. There was a bit of excitement when the boat suddenly stopped in one of the locks and we learned that a tent had got caught in the propeller. The captain swiftly dealt with the problem, however, and was rewarded with a round of applause.

After a quick lunch in La Villette it was back on the bus and "home" for a rest before the evening's entertainment. We were celebrating the 30th anniversary of the twinning between Brunoy and Reigate, so I knew that it was going to be a special evening, but I had no idea that it would be as terrific as it was. Our friends had decorated the room, set up tables for six with red and white covers and flags and hired a band for background music and dancing. There was also a viewing of pictures that had been taken during the day plus a bit of flashback. And the food....! Following an aperitif, we were treated to a massive display of salads, all prepared by our kind hosts, and a main dish, followed by cheese that had been brought from England. All this before the piece de resistance – the cakes. Two cakes, one to represent each of our countries. The French mayor and Mayor Frank Kelly all spoke before cutting the cakes and exchanging gifts.

At this point I have to mention Monique – femme extraordinaire. In addition to acting as coordinator of the trip, guide, translator and mistress of ceremonies she graciously thanked, and distributed gifts to others, such as Ann Miller, who had had the original idea of twinning. Thank you Monique.

And so the dancing began, but like Cinderella, when it unexpectedly got to midnight it was time for some of us to leave the fun and head home. I hate to think what time it was before everything was tidied away and the kind people who organized the evening got home to bed.

Sunday morning was a lazy one, free to do what we wanted. Some went to see the exhibition in the Maison des Arts; others went to the market and I went to the supermarket to buy butter of all things! At 2.30 pm we all collected at the bus, and said our goodbyes before heading for home with Richard, our trusty bus driver, and after a more or less eventless journey, midnight saw us arriving in the Reigate Town Hall parking lot.

I can't close this resume of the trip without some personal input. Thank you all for including me and for being so friendly. I enjoyed your company, thoroughly enjoyed the weekend, and I will look forward to other twinning events in the future. Vive le jumelage!

We stayed with them and would often add a few days on and go on what Jean would call 'adventures'. He spoke excellent English and would often be called upon to translate during the Town Twinning visits. I remember sitting on a stone overlooking the Isle of Wight and stirring some hot water into the powdered coffee in the mugs. Then I put out the tablecloth for the biscuits and cake. Jean had a huge smile and I asked why? He said this is so British! You would never see this in France. He had a holiday home in Provence to which we were invited and he came to my wedding to Helen in 2013.

All of us in Town Twinning will remember Jean, a warm and friendly, smiling gentleman who symbolised all the good things about Le Jumelage.

Victor Redstone

Víctor died in November 2022 just before his 100th birthday

As an early member of the Twinning Association, he was very active in exchanges with Brunoy. In these early days Danielle Malherbe was responsible, in Brunoy, for the visits to England. She was divorced, he was a widower, she was fluent in English and he did not speak a word of French : they came, they saw

and conquered each other! They married in 1996, both in Reigate and then in Brunoy. A real twinning marriage!

By the time most of us met Víctor he was the perfect English gentleman, refusing to speak French even though he lived in France for over 20 years with Danielle. His early life, as we learned at his funeral in Redhill last January, was far from ordinary. He had suffered a great deal as a war prisoner in Burma during WWII and, after the war, worked for the British government, in different European capitals. Later he worked as a MI6 agent, in London, where his children only knew that he was commuting to the "office". A very interesting life, which we, in Twinning, knew nothing about!

In Brunoy, as a retired elderly gentleman he enjoyed life, baking his special "cake anglais" for the Twinning stand at the Brunoy Christmas Market and travelling around the world with Danielle. He looked after and spoiled Danielle's many grandchildren as if they were his own. They have fond memories of their "papyboo". 5 of them came over the sea to attend his funeral in Redhill.

We will remember with affection this smartly dressed and generous friend of Twinning who made sure that the Union Jack was always flying "the right way up", even in Brunoy.
